Stained Glass Windows at Ortega United Methodist Church, Jacksonville, Florida

The stained glass windows at the Ortega United Methodist Church in Jacksonville, Florida, are beautiful and unique; and their story is entwined around the lives of Virginia and Umberto Pezzulla and the Italian artist, Anzolo Fuga.

Umberto Pezzulla was the Italian consul in Jacksonville, but he knew Europe—and especially Italy—intimately. He was a native Italian, having fought with his country during World War I when he was only a teenager. He later came to the United States where he was employed by the U. S. Navy during World War II. When he died, the *Jacksonville Journal* ran an editorial entitled "Pezzulla's Two Nations."

Umberto married Virginia Moore, a native of Michigan, who learned to speak and write Italian like a native. Virginia's father died just before the new church at Ortega was constructed, and the Pezzullas expressed a desire to make a special gift to the church in Mr. Moore's memory. That gift was to be a stained glass window.

In the fall of 1960, with church architectural plans in hand, the Pezzullas set out for Europe and a trip of several months' duration. Virginia wrote our building committee that they visited every church, cathedral, and basilica in their path, taking pictures as they went, always looking for just the right window to give to Ortega Methodist.

Finally they reached Italy where they learned of Senor Anzolo Fuga, an artist who had recently won the National Award for



Stained Glass Windows at the Exposition in Milan. After seeing many of his windows, and learning that he made windows for people of many faiths, they proceeded to Venice to see him.

The Pezzullas called Mr. Fuga and invited him to come to their hotel in Venice, where he came laden with oil paintings and slides of his work. Virginia said that the four hours they spent with him seemed more like a fleeting moment. Just

looking at the miniatures of his work gave them a deep feeling. They had no doubt that this forty-five year old artist was well qualified to adapt his artistry to our faith.

From him they learned that he uses only handmade glass, which is produced in Murano, one of the islands incorporated

in greater Venice. Some of the windows might contain as many as 120 shades of color. The color is fired in at high temperatures in a kiln and will last forever, unaffected by dampness, heat, cold, etc. His work is inspired by the traditional style of the classical figures of the thirteenth century with a modern interpretation.

Senor Fuga explained his method of operation as follows: (1) study the subject; (2) make preliminary sketches; (3) color the final drawing; (4) fuse the required pieces of glass; (5) assemble each piece in a mosaic of final dimension. Although he knew that he was being asked about only one window, he explained that it is customary to formulate a sequence against the possibility that some day all the windows could be works of art. The theme of the series would be the Life of Christ, and the central window in the sequence of sixteen would be the Last Supper. This was the window the Pezzullas wished to give. Subsequently, they wrote to Bill Maness and the Building Committee explaining all that they had learned about Professor Fuga and his work and requesting permission to give the Last Supper window. Virginia added that they were interested in contributing a work of art "if it affords pleasure to the membership" – And what pleasure it continues to give through the years!

The Building Committee approved the Pezzullas' gift with joy and anticipation. Virginia and Umberto placed their order and soon returned to Jacksonville with many slides and pictures. The church excitedly awaited the arrival of the Last Supper window! In the meantime, the new building was consecrated in February 1961. On May 12, 1961, the window left Murano, making its trip in the Captain's quarters of an Italian freighter and arrived in Jacksonville on December 12, 1961.

This vertical version of the Last Supper was mounted like a huge picture and was hung from the main masonry wall at the rear of the building. Due to its great weight, the window required special steel and special engineering to extend it some eight feet in front of the rear wall. Fluorescent lamps were used to light the window, and the installation was complete. The *Elorida Times* <u>Union</u> publicized it with a write-up and a picture of the Pezzullas admiring the window. People came from all over to revel in the beauty of this work of art. Despite the darkness of the day or night, with one flip of the switch the Last Supper comes alive.

For a number of years this was the only stained glass window in our church. Then in 1968 the United Methodist Women asked Virginia to give a program, telling of the Pezzullas' trip to Europe, the background of the Last Supper, and detailing the sequence of sixteen pictures which Professor Fuga had planned. This program sparked a renewed interest in completing the series.

In May 1969 Umberto died, and Virginia wanted to remember him by presenting

a window to the church. She talked with other members, Bob and Hazel Hancock, whose son Scott had recently been killed in Vietnam. They agreed to give a window in his memory. These windows were followed soon by two others. Spurred on by the enthusiasm and interest of a new minister, Dr. Donald W. Jones, the series of windows was completed. The last window, Pentecost, was installed in 1975.

The hours which Virginia gave to the completion of the stained glass windows cannot be calculated. Correspondence in Italian with the Bank of Italy and the artist in Venice was something no one else in the church could do. Once she had succeeded in getting a donor, Professor Fuga sent back a miniature version of that particular window done in oil. The donor was asked to approve it and make any suggestions. The painting was returned to the artist. Then months later the window arrived, having necessitated the following items to be handled: artist's fee, ocean freight, insurance, letters of credit, customs duty, local freight, plexiglas covering, and final installation.

Virginia's death came very suddenly in 1978. At the time of her passing she had two desires for the windows. One was that metal plaques be placed at each window to identify them, and the other was that the windows be lighted so that night services, especially weddings, could be beautified by the pictures in stained glass. Both of the wishes were fulfilled. Metal plaques were placed under each window in memory of the John H. Morrisons, parents of Anne Killebrew. The windows were lighted with money made by the bazaar held in 1978 by the United Methodist Women.

We do not know whether Professor Fuga is still alive; but, if he is, it is still our dream that some day he will see his windows in place. The Killebrews visited him on the island of Murano in 1990 and found him and his studio to be delightful. Our church was extremely blessed to have Anzolo Fuga as our artist and to have the Pezzullas to spearhead the entire undertaking.

The Johnson Windows

The stained glass panels on either side of the altar in the sanctuary were given "In Loving Memory of Charles Williamson Johnson, Jr." The windows represent important Biblical symbols.

The east window depicts the hand of God as He looks down upon the Fish, a symbol for Jesus, a "fisher of men."

The west side panel shows wheat and grapes, which represent the bread and the wine of communion. The Roman cross at the foot of the west window represents the resurrection of Jesus.

The vivid shades of blue, purple, red, yellow, and green coordinate perfectly with the other stained glass windows in the church. In all of these windows we are reminded of the glow and the glory of the Christian faith.

The textured panels were built by the J. Piercey Studios in Winter Park, Florida. The windows were dedicated on April 19 1981, to "the inspiration of our worship, to the humbling of our heart before eternal mysteries, and to the lifting of our souls to abiding beauty and joy."
